
Day 6 14th June 2017 Wet camp in the Mission Mountains to Seeley Lake

Another hilly day which dawned dull but definitely not raining. The plan today was for Adrian and I to get as far as Seeley Lake and hopefully share a room overnight.

Seeley Lake was a bit off the TD route and I resented the height lost but thought at least there would be somewhere inviting to stay.


> Looking south down Morrell Creek towards Seeley Lake
